

Welcome to the 16 new Cursillistas of Women's Spanish Cursillo No. 7 and for the 14 new Cursillistas from the Women's English Cursillo #41 ! We thank the teams for all of their work, including the kitchen crews.

Ten Cursillistas from the Diocese of Knoxville attended the Fall Regional Encounter in Melbourne, KY the weekend of Sept 30-Oct 2. We were in the novitiate of the Sisters of Divine Providence, part of which has been turned into a retreat center. The front steps of the main part of the building were in the opening shot of the movie, *Rain Man*. The theme was "Christ is counting on You." The talks at the workshop were taken from a book entitled "Be a Man (person)" by Fr. Larry Richards. A few of the many points that I brought home to help me read the Bible more often was to put the Bible on the floor where I normally walk and "trip over it" as an invitation to read it. I can see it being beat up by that method. The second suggestion was to put the Bible on my pillow so that I will read it before going to sleep. Before reading the Bible say: "Spirit of the Living God speak to my Heart." Prayer begins with God's prayer inside us (from Bible). Lead by example—be a person of Prayer. Avoid saying "I will "try" Lord." There is no try; you "will" do it.

At the most recent meeting of the Secretariat, we discussed changes to the By-Laws. The following are the proposed amendments for your review and comment:

Article IV. Add the following at the end of the paragraph – School of Leaders meetings in the Diocese of Knoxville will be called 4th Day Workshops to the Cursillo Community as a whole, but function as a School of Leaders.

Article V.1.a. Add the following at the end of the paragraph – The Lay Director shall serve for three (3) years and for a serious reason may be reelected for another term of office. The Lay Director may not serve more than two (2) consecutive terms. (Continued on pg. 3)

The Witness Box— Martha Green

My name is Martha Green, I made my cursillo on Namyan Mountain in Seoul, Korea in Oct. 2006. I sat at the table of St. Gemma.

This is about an event that occurred Wednesday, 7/13/11. The evening before was Parish council meeting with the new pastor and assoc pastor. I was so happy to have these new priests. Our new pastor told us he is partial to Blessed Mother Teresa's quote: "Do small things with great Love." He would like our parish to grow as a community instead of fragmented groups not communicating. So, he is aware of our parish issues, he wants to devote effort to helping us, and he shares my enthusiasm for Blessed Mother Teresa. After the parish council meeting, I went to the adoration chapel to thank God for this wonderful gift He had given our parish. I was filled with joy. In adoration, I reflected on how Mother Teresa had said that when she washes the face of a dying man, she sees the face of Jesus. She feels that this is a prayer in itself. To be washing the face of Jesus all day long is to be in a state of prayer all day long. I have tried to emulate Mother Teresa and Saint Teresa of the little flower who is my confirmation saint. By helping others in small ways and showing them compassion and respect, I am expressing love for God and my fellow man.

The following morning, I was thinking about the quote, "Do small things with great love" when I had a very clear visual image. Here is the best I can describe it.

I was stooped on the floor,


bent over a dying man, washing his face. It was very clearly the face of Jesus. I was so appreciative of this opportunity to get to wash His face, to bring Him comfort. I felt the presence of Mother Teresa beside me, guiding me. Jesus was peaceful, serene, not moving. But I could definitely hear the moans and cries of the other men. Their despair was palpable. I looked up from Jesus' face and saw the room had no walls. For as far as I could see, in every direction, there was an endless number of dying men, crying out in pain and hopelessness. It took my breath away and I panicked. How could I possibly care for all these men? Surely some would die before I could reach them. This was clearly an impossible task. I stood up and prepared to run away. Mother Teresa stood up beside me. She remained calm. In her quiet, purposeful voice, she said. "Oh my, I best get busy, Jesus is waiting." She knelt beside the closest man and began quietly washing his face.

That evening was cursillo group. I shared this visual and was encouraged to journal it. Over the next few days, I reflected on it. Here is my opinion on it. Often times, I get tired and frustrated from 'doing too much'. There seems to be a never ending need to help more. Sometimes, I feel like I am stretched too thin. There are so many more programs that need to be started. I have learned that I am not a good leader. I am a worker bee at best and a helper most of the time. I am not qualified to start programs. I am too shy to speak before

crowds. I lack the charisma to influence others. So how do I best serve God?

I think God wanted me to realize that Blessed Mother Teresa did not let the magnitude of the problem stop her from beginning. Let me repeat that. So, now, along with my motto of "Do small things with great love", I include my new motto, "I best get busy, Jesus is waiting."

Article V.1.c. Add the following at the end of the paragraph – The Secretary will maintain a current, accurate mailing and email list of all cursillistas and assume responsibility for all mailings and emails sent out by the Secretariat. The Secretary communicates with the Database Administrator.

Article V.2.b. Add the following at the end of the paragraph re Cursillo – He/she will preside and coordinate the Clausura of the Cursillo weekend. He/she will be responsible for getting the new Cursillistas' names, addresses, and email addresses from the Rector/Rectora of the Cursillo Weekends (the Roster) and give to the Cursillo Secretariat Secretary to be placed in the archives.

Article V.2.c. Remove the following at the end of the paragraph re Post Cursillo – He/She will preside and coordinate the Clausura.

Article V.3. Add the following at the end of the paragraph re SOL –The School of Leaders will also be known as “4th Day Workshop.”

Article V.6. Add the following at the end of the paragraph – If a non-voting member of the Secretariat's position becomes voting, the term of office begins anew for the three (3) year term.

We also discussed changes to the Pastoral Plan. Proposed amendments are as follows:

Three Day Cursillo, Long Term Goals – Add Encourage specific times for Palanca on an “individual” basis during regular times, especially during the week of a Three Day Weekend. Conduct Spanish language (only) Cursillos. Remove “after the establishment of a Spanish language School of Leaders and Ultreyas” as the Spanish School of Leaders has already been established. Add “Appoint bi-lingual Cursillistas to assist in various positions as assistants to the Secretariat.”

Post Cursillo, Short Term Goals – Replace Parish Representative Coordinator (current Parish Coordinator is going to study for Permanent Deaconate). Establish a position for a Spanish Post Cursillo Coordinator. Long Term Goals – Add at least one more Ultreya in the diocese. Have Parish Rep workshops at least once a year. Delete “Work with the Secretariat to publish a newsletter, at least quarterly and disseminate other appropriate information.”

School of Leaders, Add “also known as 4th Day Workshop” Short Term Goal – Delete ”Establish a schedule quarterly for meetings of the School of Leaders.” Long Term Goal – Add “Develop a format to go from meeting every other month to monthly School of Leaders.”

Copies of these recommendations will be made available at all of the Ultreyas. If you have any comments regarding the above, please contact me at schering4@aol.com. The Secretariat plans to vote on these recommendations at its October 22 Secretariat meeting.

Secretariat Positions—Jobs for Election in October

The following positions on the Secretariat are up for reelection this year: Spanish School of Leaders Director, Secretary, Treasurer and Music Director (non-voting position). All four positions serve for three years and are not limited to the number of terms served.

The Spanish School of Leaders Director maintains the effectiveness of the Cursillo Movement in the Diocese of Knoxville; provides ongoing education, training and spiritual growth for the leaders of the Cursillo Movement; intensifies the living of what is fundamental to being a Christian—in each one of our members, in the Movement as a whole, and in the environments where the members live and work and have leadership influence.

The Secretary posi-

tion takes the minutes at the Secretariat meeting, emails copies of the minutes to the Secretariat members and Assistants to the Secretariat, and posts the minutes on the web page. The Secretary will maintain a current, accurate mailing and email list of all cursillistas and assume responsibility for all mailings and emails sent out by the Secretariat. The Secretary communicates with the Database Administrator.

The treasurer maintains the Cursillo financial documents. The treasurer will do all that is necessary to ensure that the Cursillo Movement is financially sound at all times and that local, regional and national financial obligation are met.

The Music Director position creates and maintains a music support system for all major Cursillo functions, assists the Three Day Area with the recruiting and placing of individuals

to support the team for the Weekends. The Music Director recommends and prepares the Weekend music minister to Rector/Rectora and is available to the Weekend ministers.

Each candidate whether they are currently serving in the position or not must submit in writing their intention to run for a particular position by snail mail or email to the Lay Director at least seven days prior to the election on October 22, 2011. Each current Secretariat area will have one vote for each position. The votes will be by secret ballot and be counted by Fr. Alex.

Although not a Secretariat position at this time, the Spanish Cursillistas need a Post Cursillo Coordinator to bring about Christian transformation of environments using the Cursillo method of Piety, Study and Action, and to foster encouragement and perseverance primarily through Group Reunion and Ultreya. Please pray about it and say “Here I am” to the urgings of the Holy Spirit.

A Restless Heart

This is a summary of a presentation by Rev. Peter Jaramillo the National Spiritual Advisor for the Cursillo Movement in the U.S. He is an Augustinian priest and this is part of their spirituality. We all experience having a restless heart at some time in our lives. He began by referencing some of the scriptures that reference the heart that God has made for us; and how God calls us to use our hearts, or how God blesses our hearts with the love we need and long for. Dt. 6:6 “Love God with your whole heart...” 1 Kings 3:12 At Solomon’s request, God said “I give you a heart so wise and understanding... “ Psalm 139:23 “Probe me, God, know my heart; try me, know my thoughts.” Matthew 11:28-30 “Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart; and you will find rest for your selves. For my yoke is easy, and my burden light.” Matthew 15:8 “This people honor me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me...” Luke 23:32 “Were not our hearts burning (within us) while he spoke to us on the way and opened the scriptures to us?” 1 Corinthians 12:31 “Set your hearts on the greater gifts, and I will show you a still more excellent way.” In summary, all scripture is to help us to know, live and experience life with all of your heart.

St. Augustine meditated on his heart's desires, his book

“Confessions” is about his journey to the Lord. Our heart’s challenge is to overcome loneliness caused by sin or alienation. Or in other words, a pilgrim’s awareness of his journey to completeness is to be aware of his incompleteness. We desire to be satisfied, but can’t totally be satisfied in this world

“Our hearts are restless until they rest in thee O Lord” is an often quoted line of St. Augustine.

He said that Devotion to the Sacred Heart and Immaculate Heart are about coming to know the Heart of Jesus because He is exposing His

burning Heart to people. His Heart is burning with love for us. See the 15 promises of the Sacred Heart to those who honor the image and the Heart it represents. Among these promises are grace necessary for your state in life, peace in the home... a secure refuge of mercy during life and above all in death.

What might we see as we approach His Heart? When Paul was persecuting Christ, on the road to Damascus Paul saw the persecuted heart of Jesus. This turned Paul around and brought Paul to his knees. Do we want a pure, loving heart? One like Jesus? Yes. Is this what is worthwhile? “Why spend your money for what is not bread; your wages for what does not satisfy?” (Is. 55:2) Jesus fills us with what satisfies, his very life, love, grace. Sometimes we are unaware of what we need; it is like being sick without the proper diagnosis.

The struggle of the heart

and will is at times disjointed. I need a willingness to surrender my will. Sometimes I want to stay in my sin because it is pleasurable, yet uncomfortable, I am broken and yet I still struggle and resist.

The biggest part is to trust Him. “I do believe, help my unbelief” Mark 9:24. I want to trust but may not fully be there yet. Repeat many times: “Jesus I trust in You.” “Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life.” John 6:68. Trust or not? Do I make a leap of faith? We want to renew our encounter of Jesus in Faith. We have a willingness to enter into a journey of faith. I live my Cursillo now, not I lived in in 1997.

My love is impure, selfish, and incomplete. His love is perfect. I find peace this world cannot give as we read in John 14:27. How do we experience touching the wounds of Christ? Do we bring our wounds to Christ?

Don’t speak only of conversion in the past. Speak of your conversion now, daily. Eduardo Bonin witnessed his living for and loving Jesus. Rejoice in who we are and what we have.

We pray to Jesus for courage and the grace to be converted to Him. May your home/heart be blessed.

He offered the following questions for reflection: How have I come to rest in the Lord? In what ways do I rest in Him? How do I become more authentic when I am in Christ or when I rest in Christ?

Cursillo proposes no new type of spirituality, but simply a method through which one's spirituality may be developed, lived, and shared in any area of human life, where there are Christians willing to dedicate their lives to Christ in an ongoing manner. The method is introduced on a Cursillo weekend.

In 1963, Pope Paul VI appointed St. Paul as the official Patron of the Cursillo Movement. On that occasion he said:

"This method of Christian teaching, commonly called Cursillos in Christianity, extends already over a great number of faithful and has produced abundant fruit; Christian renewal of the family life, visualization of parishes, faithful observance of duties, in private, as well as public. All this has filled the Bishops and other Shepherds of souls with the greatest satisfaction."
