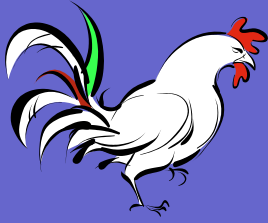

## Of What Use is the Cursillo?

I was startled when I first read these words, especially since they were written by Eduardo Bonnin Aguiló (principal founder of the Cursillo movement). It took several more sentences before he asked the question again, saying “Of what use is the Cursillo, if there is nothing which you need to accomplish?” I was struck by this statement on a number of levels, the first being the word *need*. Why didn’t he just say “things which you want to accomplish” or “things which you wish to accomplish” instead?

I took this to prayer, and in the process ended up questioning my real motivation for being active in Cursillo. Over the following few weeks, I found myself making a careful examination of all of my interests and ministry activities, asking myself: What is that I *want* to accomplish here, what is it I *wish* to accomplish here...What is it that I *need* to accomplish here? I discovered that my reflection on these questions has had a true and lasting impact on everything that I do, every single day.

Each of us have different life experiences, and come to serve the Lord by different paths. Most cursillistas I know at have a genuine love of the Lord and possess great enthusiasm for serving Him. The encounter with the Holy Spirit at a Cursillo weekend is a powerful experience, and we respond to that encounter in different ways. Some seem to thrive best in fellowship with other cursillistas, some prefer a more solitary Fourth Day journey, some cannot seem to keep the word Cursillo off of their lips, even years after their weekend.

I frequently hear people describe their feelings about a particular interest or activity as being their **passion**. I’m sure that we each have many things about which we are passionate. Do these represent the things that we *need* to do, versus activities which we find to be just simple pleasures, or find stimulating in some other way? As we examine our lives, and our activities and involvements in our environments, do we find things we have a *need* to accomplish?

I hope that you will take the time to consider what you do, and what you feel you are put there to accomplish. Reflect on Eduardo’s words and see where they may take you. De Colores!

# NATIONAL CURSILLO ENCOUNTER 2012

My wife Lisa and I were blessed to attend the 22<sup>nd</sup> National Cursillo Encounter, held at Xavier University from July 19 – 22, 2012. We had a great time and learned many things on that weekend. Not the least of which were:

- (1) Our diocese was well-represented, with 14 attendees
- (2) Our own Father Alex is widely known and respected throughout the National Cursillo Community, and
- (3) Cursillistas are the some of the finest people you will ever meet (of course, we knew that already). Imagine 600 people in one room, all practicing the Cursillo Method at the same time!

At the time of pre-registration, I didn't know what to expect from the National Encounter weekend, but I assumed I would learn practical things (how to be a better sponsor, how to improve my Fourth Day, etc.). I was surprised to find rollos on such subjects as "Attitude," "Creativity," "Communication," and "Confidence." It became apparent that, rather than simply re-stating concepts we learned in our weekend many years ago, this conference would challenge us to re-examine many of our thoughts and beliefs about the Cursillo. We also benefitted from the perspective and ideas of seasoned Cursillistas from around the country, with decades of service in our movement.

The speakers were all of high caliber, and each challenged us to re-think what we thought we knew about the Weekend and our Fourth Day. Our first speaker was Juan Ruiz (Cursillo National Spanish-speaking Coordinator), who presented a rollo entitled "The Meaning of Life."

I was so impressed by his humility, his intellect, and the earnestness of his presentation that I asked him if he could send me a copy of his speech, so that I could consider it further. An email to Juan resulted in a very courteous and humble reply, along with a copy of the talk he delivered. Here is some excerpts of his talk which I found most meaningful to me:

*We all are familiar the Baltimore Catechism definition of the meaning of life being "to know God, to love God, and to serve God..." So then we are left to decide on the values upon which this meaning of life is based. As cursillistas, that includes the definition of our Christian Ideal, therefore our Fourth Day is only as strong as our determination to follow our Ideal...The true meaning of life, which is actually the happiness all human beings seek, is not found in the passing and relative values of the world, but in the Christian values that Jesus Christ himself taught us and left us in the Gospels. We forget or do not know, maybe because nobody has told us in a convincing manner, that by living our Christian Ideal, by living the Gospel of Christ, we find a happiness that multiplies itself with each experience. In our conscious effort to live these values, we begin to see everything around us differently.*

Mr. Ruiz pointed out that, as we begin to live out and persevere in our Fourth Day, we discover many obstacles, which may include over-identification with our environments. He saw this as the tendency to seek logical and scientific answers to things which happen around us, and in doing so, we begin to distance ourselves from the presence of Christ and His values. Then we begin to lose our understanding of the true meaning of life. Little by little, we lose the balance needed to live our Christian virtues. We end up justifying everything we want to be, and how we want to live, and in this process we create our own "meaning of life."

My personal take-away from his talk was this: each of us knows people who came away from their weekend filled with zeal and good intentions, but they allow themselves to backslide from the Life of Grace, consumed by their earthly distractions. Is it poor sponsorship, or an un-inviting Ultreya or small group community, or the absence of palanca support? Do they not have good examples to follow? My personal observation, supported by what I learned from this rollo, is that a poorly-formed Ideal leads to confusion and conflict. This allows the world to rob the cursillista of his or her pursuit of grace.

In my opinion, the first lay talk of the weekend (Ideal), and the response of the candidate to the later challenge of development and formation of their Christian Ideal, is a key ingredient in their ability to persevere in their Fourth Day. In the future, I will be more attentive to the development of the Christian Ideal in the candidates that I sponsor.

To anyone who is looking for a new perspective on their Fourth Day journey, I would suggest attending an upcoming regional or national Cursillo Encounter. Be sure and tell everyone you meet that you are close personal friends with Father Alex!

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## The Deacon's Two Cents



**I've got that joy, joy, joy, joy...**

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Many of us remember that famous line in the film *Apollo 13*, where Flight Director Gene Krantz bolsters the confidence of NASA workers during the crisis by declaring, "Failure is not an option!" If we read the Scriptures carefully, we can find a state of mind which is an absolute requirement for us as committed Christians, and that is to experience joy, and rejoice in all that we do. It is as though the Bible repeatedly reminds us, "Joy is not an option!"

Many Scripture passages remind us of this requirement for joy. Saint Paul tells the Philippians in Chapter 4: "Rejoice in the Lord always. I shall say it again: rejoice!" (He has to tell us twice, so that we don't miss the point.) The first letter of Peter says that in believing in Christ, "[we] rejoice with an indescribable and glorious joy." In Saint John's account of the Last Supper (chapter 15), Jesus sums up all that he sought to do in his earthly ministry with this prayer: "I have told you this so that my joy may be in you, and your joy may be complete."

Yet we see so many Christians live their lives looking like they are sucking on lemons. They are so serious and unsmiling when they should be rejoicing. Let's face it—who are we attracting to Christianity, when Christ's followers all look like they just had a root canal?

When we reflect on our Cursillo weekend,

we can recall many moments of the joy of the Holy Spirit working in our hearts. We sang songs that were off-key, yet filled with exuberant joy. Our table sharings were often intense, but also filled with the joy of shared Christian experiences. And who can forget the joy we felt when the Christian community welcomed us back during the clausura?

The Cursillo encourages us, and Scripture commands us, to carry that joy into all aspects of our Christian life, so that we may truly "bloom where we are planted." Let us be filled with joy, as we serve our parish in all of our ministries. Let our joy overflow, as we seek to spread the Gospel message in our workplace. Let all of our Cursillo gatherings, from Group Reunion to Ultreya and beyond, be gatherings of pure joy. Let our faces be radiant with joy, as we encounter Our Lord in the sacraments. It is this kind of joy that will attract others; they will want what we have; we will better be able to "bring that friend to Christ."

My prayer for all of us, in the coming weeks and months, is for us to have a joy-filled heart in all that we do. May the completeness of joy, which the Lord wanted us to receive at the Last Supper, help us to become the Cursillistas that Jesus calls us to be.
